## The Bible

## 1. James 1:17

<sup>17</sup> Every good gift and every perfect gift is from above, and cometh down from the Father of lights, with whom is no variableness, neither shadow of turning.

## 2. II Kings 4:1–7

- <sup>1</sup> Now there cried a certain woman of the wives of the sons of the prophets unto Elisha, saying, Thy servant my husband is dead; and thou knowest that thy servant did fear the Lord: and the creditor is come to take unto him my two sons to be bondmen.
- <sup>2</sup> And Elisha said unto her, What shall I do for thee? tell me, what hast thou in the house? And she said, Thine handmaid hath not any thing in the house, save a pot of oil.
- <sup>3</sup> Then he said, Go, borrow thee vessels abroad of all thy neighbours, *even* empty vessels; borrow not a few.
- <sup>4</sup> And when thou art come in, thou shalt shut the door upon thee and upon thy sons, and shalt pour out into all those vessels, and thou shalt set aside that which is full.
- <sup>5</sup> So she went from him, and shut the door upon her and upon her sons, who brought *the vessels* to her; and she poured out.
- <sup>6</sup> And it came to pass, when the vessels were full, that she said unto her son, Bring me yet a vessel. And he said unto her, *There is* not a vessel more. And the oil stayed.
- <sup>7</sup> Then she came and told the man of God. And he said, Go, sell the oil, and pay thy debt, and live thou and thy children of the rest.

# 3. Ex. 17:1–6

- <sup>1</sup> And all the congregation of the children of Israel journeyed from the wilderness of Sin, after their journeys, according to the commandment of the Lord, and pitched in Rephidim: and *there was* no water for the people to drink.
- <sup>2</sup> Wherefore the people did chide with Moses, and said, Give us water that we may drink. And Moses said unto them, Why chide ye with me? wherefore do ye tempt the Lord?
- <sup>3</sup> And the people thirsted there for water; and the people murmured against Moses, and said, Wherefore *is* this *that* thou hast brought us up out of Egypt, to kill us and our children and our cattle with thirst?
- <sup>4</sup> And Moses cried unto the Lord, saying, What shall I do unto this people? they be almost ready to stone me.
- <sup>5</sup> And the Lord said unto Moses, Go on before the people, and take with thee of the elders of

Israel; and thy rod, wherewith thou smotest the river, take in thine hand, and go.

<sup>6</sup> Behold, I will stand before thee there upon the rock in Horeb; and thou shalt smite the rock, and there shall come water out of it, that the people may drink. And Moses did so in the sight of the elders of Israel.

# 4. II Cor. 8:13-15 I

- <sup>13</sup> ... *I mean* not that other men be eased, and ye burdened:
- <sup>14</sup> But by an equality, *that* now at this time your abundance *may be a supply* for their want, that their abundance also may be *a supply* for your want: that there may be equality:
- <sup>15</sup> As it is written, He that *had gathered* much had nothing over; and he that *had gathered* little had no lack.

# 5. Matt. 17:24–27

- <sup>24</sup> ¶ And when they were come to Capernaum, they that received tribute *money* came to Peter, and said, Doth not your master pay tribute?
- <sup>25</sup> He saith, Yes. And when he was come into the house, Jesus prevented him, saying, What thinkest thou, Simon? of whom do the kings of the earth take custom or tribute? of their own children, or of strangers?
- <sup>26</sup> Peter saith unto him, Of strangers. Jesus saith unto him, Then are the children free.
- <sup>27</sup> Notwithstanding, lest we should offend them, go thou to the sea, and cast an hook, and take up the fish that first cometh up; and when thou hast opened his mouth, thou shalt find a piece of money: that take, and give unto them for me and thee.

# 6. Mark 12:41–44

- <sup>41</sup> ¶ And Jesus sat over against the treasury, and beheld how the people cast money into the treasury: and many that were rich cast in much.
- <sup>42</sup> And there came a certain poor widow, and she threw in two mites, which make a farthing.
- <sup>43</sup> And he called *unto him* his disciples, and saith unto them, Verily I say unto you, That this poor widow hath cast more in, than all they which have cast into the treasury:
- <sup>44</sup> For all *they* did cast in of their abundance; but she of her want did cast in all that she had, *even* all her living.

# Science & Health

# 1. SH 206:15

<sup>15</sup> In the scientific relation of God to man, we find that whatever blesses one blesses all, as Jesus showed with the loaves and the fishes, — Spirit, not matter, being the 18 source of supply.

#### 2. SH 66:6

- Trials teach mortals not to lean on a material staff, —
  a broken reed, which pierces the heart. We do not
  half remember this in the sunshine of joy
- 9 and prosperity. Sorrow is salutary. Through great tribulation we enter the kingdom. Trials are proofs of God's care. Spiritual development germi-
- nates not from seed sown in the soil of material hopes, but when these decay, Love propagates anew the higher joys of Spirit, which have no taint of earth. Each suc-
- 15 cessive stage of experience unfolds new views of divine goodness and love.

#### 3. SH 216:11

- The understanding that the Ego is Mind, and that 12 there is but one Mind or intelligence, begins at once to destroy the errors of mortal sense and to supply the truth of immortal sense. This understand-
- ing makes the body harmonious; it makes the nerves, bones, brain, etc., servants, instead of masters. If man is governed by the law of divine Mind, his body is in sub-
- <sup>18</sup> mission to everlasting Life and Truth and Love. The great mistake of mortals is to suppose that man, God's image and likeness, is both matter and Spirit, both good
- $_{21}$  and evil.

## 4. SH 257:30-12

- It would require an infinite form to contain infinite
  Mind. Indeed, the phrase *infinite form* involves a contradiction of terms. Finite man cannot be the image and
- likeness of the infinite God. A mortal, corporeal, or finite conception of God cannot embrace the glories of
- <sup>3</sup> limitless, incorporeal Life and Love. Hence the unsatisfied human craving for something better, higher, holier, than is afforded by a
- <sup>6</sup> material belief in a physical God and man. The insufficiency of this belief to supply the true idea proves the falsity of material belief.
- 9 Man is more than a material form with a mind inside, which must escape from its environments in order to be immortal. Man reflects infinity,

Servants and masters

Infinite physique impossible

Infinity's reflection

<sub>12</sub> and this reflection is the true idea of God.

#### 5. SH 446:24

- Resisting evil, you overcome it and prove its nothingness. Not human platitudes, but divine beatitudes, reflect the spiritual light and might which heal
- 27 the sick. The exercise of will brings on a hypnotic state, detrimental to health and integrity of thought. This must therefore be watched and guarded
- 30 against. Covering iniquity will prevent prosperity and the ultimate triumph of any cause. Ignorance of the error to be eradicated oftentimes subjects you to its abuse.

#### 6. SH 133:8

In Egypt, it was Mind which saved the Israelites from

- 9 belief in the plagues. In the wilderness, streams flowed from the rock, and manna fell from the sky. The Israelites looked upon the brazen serpent, and straightway believed
- that they were healed of the poisonous stings of vipers.In national prosperity, miracles attended the successes of the Hebrews; but when they departed from the true
- <sup>15</sup> idea, their demoralization began. Even in captivity among foreign nations, the divine Principle wrought wonders for the people of God in the fiery furnace and is birst back.
- 18 in kings' palaces.

## 7. SH xii:6

- <sup>6</sup> During seven years over four thousand students were taught by the author in this College. Meanwhile she was pastor of the first established Church of
- <sup>9</sup> Christ, Scientist; President of the first Christian Scientist Association, convening monthly; publisher of her own works; and (for a portion of this time) sole
- editor and publisher of the Christian Science Journal, the first periodical issued by Christian Scientists. She closed her College, October 29, 1889, in the height of
- <sup>15</sup> its prosperity with a deep-lying conviction that the next two years of her life should be given to the preparation of the revision of SCIENCE AND HEALTH, which
- 18 was published in 1891. She retained her charter, and as its President, reopened the College in 1899 as auxiliary to her church. Until June 10, 1907, she had never
- 21 read this book throughout consecutively in order to elu-

#### 8. SH 323:13

In order to apprehend more, we must put into practice what we already know. We must recollect that

- 15 Truth is demonstrable when understood, and that good is not understood until demonstrated.If "faithful over a few things," we shall be made rulers
- 18 over many; but the one unused talent decays and is lost.When the sick or the sinning awake to realize their need of what they have not, they will be receptive of divine
- 21 Science, which gravitates towards Soul and away from material sense, removes thought from the body, and elevates even mortal mind to the contemplation of some-
- thing better than disease or sin. The true idea of God gives the true understanding of Life and Love, robs the grave of victory, takes away all sin and the delusion that
- $_{\rm 27}\,$  there are other minds, and destroys mortality.

## 9. SH 571:15

- At all times and under all circumstances, overcome evil with good. Know thyself, and God will supply the wisdom and the occasion for a victory
- over evil. Clad in the panoply of Love,
  human hatred cannot reach you. The cement of a
  higher humanity will unite all interests in the one

21 divinity.
